

FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all programs that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. At your initial visit, your provider will review these rights with you and ask you to sign that you understand the rights as presented. Parental Rights Under Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

Under FERPA, parents have the right to:

- Access their child's educational records, or receive a copy of the records, within 45 days of the request.
- S Consent to the release of the child's records.
 - The reason for the disclosure, record to be released and the person/party to whom the disclosure is to be made must be provided.
- 8 Request that an educational record be amended.
- Sile a complaint should any of these rights be violated.
